## **URGENT SHORT-TERM PET CARE**

It's been 16 months since we launched Urgent Short-term Pet Care, and it is in full swing. The demands for USPC are greater and more unpredictable than we anticipated. One month might not have any calls and next month several calls. We carefully consider every request for USPC. The first four months of 2025, we provided care for six dogs and two cats.

USPC's goal is to help cats and dogs during what may be their owner's most difficult time of need. Pets are referred to us through nursing homes, hospitals, rehabilitation centers, mental health agencies and homeless shelters collaborate with the pet owner and/or family. We customize needs based upon what is best for the pet during the time we have them and in USPC, we have provided much needed veterinary care, foster care, boarding, and in-home care. We have had a pet for as little as five days and as long as 60 days. Our 2025 USPC pets, to date, are Buddy, Sandy, Katie, Beckett, Midnight, Kitty, Ash and Surabi.

Leslie is one of our USPC foster moms and she said this about her experience: "I had the pleasure of being able to welcome Beckett into my home while her owner had surgery and recovered at a rehab facility. Beckett was such a wonderful house guest for the two weeks I had her. Sandy (Paws-itive Partners member) was very attentive in making sure my household was adjusting well, and most importantly, that Beckett was doing well. We were able to get Beckett in to enjoy a spa day which was such a treat. What an incredible program Urgent Short-term Pet Care is for those who need medical care and have fur children who need cared for during their treatment. It was a great experience for all involved!"

## GET 'EM FIXED AND LOVE MY CAT

Paws-itive Partners' mission is Working together to do for animals what they cannot do for themselves" and "do" means spaying and neutering. Stopping animal overpopulation and ending animal suffering by preventing the problem of breeding before it starts.

Paws-itive Partners makes spaying and neutering financially feasible for lower income pet owners. Our Get 'Em Fixed program is for dogs and cats and is available year 'round. Our Lower Income Love My Cat program is available in March and October and spaying and neutering cats costs the pet owner only \$45. Our sterilization programs are the costliest part of Paws-itive Partners but that is what we do. We spay/neuter hundreds of cats and dogs each year.

In March, Husky mom Sara contacted us to help spay her seven-year-old Storm. Storm's surgery turned out more complicated than expected and Sara sent the following: "Storm's surgery saved her life and I'm so thankful for everyone helping me...Her uterus was twisted, and one ovary was full of cysts. There was a tumor plus a nodule. I'm so grateful to you. I'm crying with joy that you could help me." Paws-itive Partners paid the cost of the major surgery. Sara is donating back to Paws-itive Partners so we will be able to help another animal that needs us.

Besides preventing pregnancy, there are many reasons to spay/neuter. These are a few benefits from sterilizing a pet:

~increases life expectancy

~reduces or eliminates the risk for mammary gland tumors, ovarian cancer and uterine cancer in females

~eliminates the risk of testicular cancer and reduces risks for prostrate diseases in males

~reduces the desire to roam, improves safety by reducing injury from fighting or automobile accidents

(Statistics show that as many as 85% of dogs hit by cars are unaltered.)

~reduces overall health issues, which is good for the pet and lowers your medical costs

~reduces or eliminates spraying and marking by male cats and dogs.

A kitten born today can become a mother, grandmother and great grandmother in one year.

## **GIVING DAY 2025**

Paws-itive Partners is fortunate to be included in Mid Nebraska Community Foundation's Giving Day. Giving Day is a way that anyone is easily able to help Paws-itive Partners do what we do. Now, through May 7, Giving Day is open for early donating and is an opportunity to help us get a jumpstart raising funds for our cause. We will use Giving Day donations to help animals in our Urgent Short-term Pet Care program.

Urgent Short-term Pet Care is a unique program that helps pets belonging to people in an acute situation involving hospitalization, entering rehabilitation after an accident/surgery or families displaced briefly from their home. Paws-itive Partners started USPC when we were told about pet owners (oftentimes elderly) neglected their own important needs because they didn't have someone to care for their four-legged family members. With a referral from the pet owner's provider such as hospital, nursing home, hospice, mental health services or homeless shelter, USPC customizes a plan specifically for the person's pet until they can return home.

# NORTH PLATTE PET FOOD PANTRY

The North Platte Pet Food Pantry is open to pet owners who need help feeding their cat or dog. The pantry is located at 5302 South Willow #104 and is open every Monday from 5:30 to 6:30 pm.

The importance of the pantry continues to rise, and thousands of pounds of pet food are collected, stocked and given out to pet owners every year.

Four months into 2025, Paws-itive Partners has served 664 pet owners and dispersed 13,500 lbs. dry dog food, 20 cans canned dog food, 5260 lbs. dry cat food and 100 cans canned cat food.

We always appreciate pet food donations. Thank you to Lake Elementary PTO for their large donation of pet food, to Broken Bow Tractor Supply for a pallet of dog food and Menard's for hosting their pet food drive for the pantry.

#### **C.A.R.E CARES**

## **A FEW MORE STORIES**

When we think we couldn't be any busier, that's when more happen. There are times we get frustrated or sad, but we find that most of the time dedication pays off and things get better. We love working hard to help cats and dogs. Paws-itive Partners is a *pawsitive* group. We know people don't like hearing the negative things that happen, so we usually keep news positive. Here are a few things we have gotten ourselves into recently that became positive for cats and dogs:

January: Paws-itive Partners took a beautiful yellow labrador as a surrender from her owner. The dog was in one of our best foster homes for three months before going to her even better adoptive home. We received an update about Sweet Thing a few days ago and "She's doing great! Even our cats like her – unless she's running through the house and then they're smart enough to get out of her way."

<u>February:</u> A homeless woman's dog gave birth to six puppies in her car. Two days later, her other dog gave birth to seven puppies. Repeatedly, for the next 10 days, there was contact, then lost contact with the woman. She vacillated between surrendering her dogs and puppies to us to not do so. One Saturday morning, the owner called and said we could have Molly and her puppies. We jumped into action before she changed her mind and surrender papers were signed, and we got the fur family. No more uncertainty and homelessness for Molly and her puppies. The fur family was placed in the loving hands of foster mom Reagan. Reagan cared for and nurtured Molly and her puppies – if you have had puppies, you know how time consuming doing it right is.

Everyone has thrived and now all the puppies have been adopted. Molly is in a foster home awaiting adoption.

Bootsie dislocated her hip when falling from a tree and her distraught owner called Paws-itive Partners to help. The veterinarian performed reduction surgery (manually putting the hip back into the correct position) and the cat is doing well. The owner agreed to make Bootsie an indoor cat where there is no more risk of falling from a tree.

<u>March:</u> We received a phone message and returned the call to the owner of a pest control company. He didn't know what Paws-itive Partners did but wanted to know if we could destroy feral cats from a customer's property! Shocked, we tried making the conversation a teaching opportunity. We talked about trapping, neutering and returning cats and the most effective way to control feral cats. The man asked questions and was receptive to the idea of TNR. We mentioned the cost of spaying and neutering and he said if his customer had TNR'd it would have been less expensive than his fees. It was good to think we might have helped with future problems in a humane way.

<u>April:</u> This has been a month for cats. The area motel owner sounded hopeless. A long-time tenant suffered an "episode," and after her release by the hospital and sheriff department the woman refused to return to her motel room. She was suddenly fearful of her pet cats she had had for many years. She wanted the cats out and the motel owner didn't know what to do. He asked the Animal Shelter and Sheriff Department for help, but they couldn't. An animal lover, the man knew he couldn't just open the motel room and shoo the cats outside.

Paws-itive Partners fed the cats in the less-than ideal-motel room and one cat allowed us to pet him but the other cat stayed hidden. On the fourth day, with a whole lot of effort, we trapped the frightened cats. Milo and Mookie were taken to their first ever veterinarian appointments for examinations, tests and vaccinations. We had kept the motel owner up to date on what we were doing, and he texted us, "I could not be happier with the outcome today. I was in a desperate situation and didn't know what to do. Thank you so much!"

As soon as they completed their veterinary appointments, a Paws-itive Partners member transported the cats to meet up with an amazing cat advocate that has decades of experience helping animals. Ms. Molly has Milo and Mookie and is working on rehabilitation. Checking in with her, we were reminded rehabilitation "is a marathon, not a sprint" and it takes time and patience.

We completed TNR on 12 cats at a home north of North Platte.

We took in two beautiful cats through our Urgent Short-term Pet Care program. They are doing well in foster care and we anticipate them returning to their family in two weeks.

We received a call from a man who found four kittens nursing on their dead mother. The man called the Animal Shelter, and the shelter suggested calling Pawsitive Partners. We knew we had to save the kittens and in short-order Foster Mom she had everything she needed for the adorable kittens – food, kitten formula, toys, a bed and most important of all, snuggling.

Three days into the kittens' stay, they made their first trip to the veterinarian for checkups. The kittens are underweight but with their raging appetites this won't be a problem for long. One kitten has returned to the clinic for hydrating and an overnight stay, but they are doing well. Thank you so very much Foster Mom Bevie!
